
RESOLUTION ADOPTING 2013 NOXIOUS WEED CONTROL PLAN





Statement of Finding

The failure to control noxious weeds on lands in this state is a serious problem which is detrimental to the production of crops and livestock and to the welfare of residents of this state and which may devalue land and reduce tax revenue (Neb. Rev. Stat. 2-945.02(1)).

Section 2-954 of the Nebraska Noxious Weed Control Act requires each weed control authority to establish a coordinated program for the control of noxious weeds within the county.

Goals

Goal one: During the 2013 season, I will again work closely with the Papio- Missouri NRD this goal will be ongoing throughout the 2013 season. The Papio NRD has been very instrumental in providing funding for the purchase of an ATV and helicopter spraying for phragmites, purple loosestrife and saltcedar along the Platte River in Sarpy County. The Papio NRD is also offering a "50/50" cost share program to property owners having infestations of phragmites, purple loosestrife and saltcedar a long Platte & Elkhorn River's.

This season the Papio NRD has agreed to pay for maintenance cost's incurred by the 10 Counties that belong to the (Lower Platte Weed Management Area) Reimbursements will be made for airboat expenses chemicals purchased and used, inspections made by airboat and airplane also the use of part-time seasonal help while spraying on the Platte & Elkhorn River's. It has been a goal of mine to obtain maintenance funding from the Papio NRD for many years. With the help of several other weed superintendents we have worked long and hard to get the Lower Platte Weed management Area this funding.

The Lower Platte Weed Management Area held their election of officers in December of 2012 and I was elected as the new President of the Lower Platte WMA the term is for two years.

During the 2013 season I will again work closely with the State of Nebraska Department of Roads I will again encourage NDOR to make timely control efforts on the noxious weed infestations along their Highways and Interstate rights of way.

Goal two: During the 2013 season I plan to meet with the State of Nebraska Department of Roads. I had several meetings with NDOR last season along with the Noxious Weed Superintendent of Douglas County Mike Reed. Together we met with NDOR several times last season about the condition of their rights of way. Each season NDOR assures us that they going to mow and spray the noxious weed infestations along their rights of way in a timely manner. I will continue working with Douglas County and NDOR throughout the 2013 season.

Goal three: Is also an ongoing goal I will continue to work with landowners that have infestations of phragmites, purple loosestrife and saltcedar along the Platte, Elkhorn & Missouri Rivers to insure that proper control efforts are being made. I will also continue to work with landowners having other noxious weed infestations. And I will work with neighboring counties such as Cass, Douglas and Saunders to insure that control efforts are being made along our borders area Rivers and Waterways.

I am also working with land owners that have infestation of upland phragmites. Small patches of upland phragmites seem to be popping up all over in areas that are next to creeks and damp low-lying areas throughout the county. I have been contacting the land owners and getting these sites sprayed as I find them. I have several new sites that need to be sprayed during the 2013 season.

General

In this section, list how your county achieved last season's goals and were they successful? Explain.

My goal to establish funding from the Papio NRD for a continuing maintenance river spraying fund has been reached. This season the Papio Missouri NRD, Lower Platte North NRD and the Lower Platte South NRD have agreed to pay for maintenance cost's incurred by the 10 Counties that belong to the (Lower Platte Weed Management Area) Reimbursements will be made for airboat expenses chemicals purchased and used, inspections made by airboat and airplane also the use of part-time seasonal help while spraying on the Platte & Elkhorn River's. I will continue to working with the Papio NRD to help insure that we receive this funding from season to season.

Once again with the use of the ATV I was able to get more roadside areas sprayed in the 2012 season.

By promoting noxious weed awareness with property owners along the Platte River and helping property owners get signed up for the "50/50" cost share program" with the Papio NRD we are seeing more compliance along the Platte River. Infestations of phragmites and purple loosestrife are being reduced. I am also assisting property owners that have upland phragmites infestations to help get these areas under control.

I will also continue working with the State of Nebraska Department of Roads promoting noxious weed awareness. Last summer Mike Reed the Douglas County Weed Superintendent and I had several meetings with NDOR and we seemed to get more cooperation last season than we have in the pasted. I will continue working with Douglas County and NDOR throughout the 2013 season.

2. Given the fact that the groundwork had been completed and the Superintendent had all pertinent information at hand. The Superintendent would first try to call the property owner at home. The Superintendent would then instruct the owner that a noxious weed infestation had been found on their property. The Superintendent would give the owner alternatives on controlling the infestation and advise the owner that the infestation needs to be controlled as soon as possible. The Superintendent will make every effort to assist the property owner in controlling the infestation. The Superintendent may also send a letter if time will allow, if all attempts to contact the owner fail the Superintendent will send the Ten Day Notice.

3. List the guidelines or policy that the control authority has established for the weed superintendent to follow when **issuing and enforcing an individual notice**. (Include information regarding inspections, evidence, officials to be notified, etc.)

3. Given the fact that the property owner has been contacted and has declined to perform the control work. The first inspection report would have been filled out. This report would include the county, date, and legal description, site in acres, that it was a complaint. The habitat, stage of growth, the type of noxious weed and or weeds found, the severity, a diagram of the area, the comments of the inspector and the inspector's signature.

Pictures would also be taken of the property a ten day notice would be sent by registered mail. Upon return of the registered receipt with the owner's signature the Superintendent would know that property owner did receive the ten day notice. The owner would be given ten days from the date at the bottom of the notice. At this time if the Superintendent felt that there might be a problem in enforcing the notice. The Superintendent would contact the Chairman of the Control Authority board, the Sheriff and the County Attorney.

On the eleventh day the property will be inspected in the same manner as it was first inspected. At this time if the control work has not been completed or has yet to be started the Superintendent would have a contractor ready to perform the control work? When the contractor is finished a notice of Unpaid Weed Control Assessment will be filed at the Register of Deeds Office. In the amount of a \$75.00 dollar administrative fee plus the cost of the control work, if the same remains unpaid for two months said assessment shall become a lien. The noxious weed control department will pay the contractor for the cost of the control work.

Public Awareness

Explain the type of public relations activities that your county will use in the upcoming year to increase public awareness (newspaper articles, interviews, presentations given, weed tours, landowner contacts, etc.). **Do not include the required general notice in this section.**

1, Increasing public awareness is important in order to educate the public on noxious weed control the Superintendent may write short articles for the Extension Office newsletter. The public that will be targeted by the newsletter will be farmers, acreage owners and commercial property owners, The Superintendent intends to contact property owners having infestations of noxious weeds on their land. The contacts will be made in person, brochures left at the home, by phone, in the form of a letter or legal notice. The primary notice that will be used in most cases will be the Ten Day Notice. However this will depend greatly on the time element and the situation at hand. The Superintendent will work in close contact with the Control Authority, District Supervisor. County Attorney and the Farm Service Agency. These objectives will continue throughout the 2013 growing - season.

Cooperative Efforts

Does your county actively support and participate in a weed management cooperative group?

Sarpy County is a member of the Lower Platte Weed Management Area the main focus of the group is working together to control Phragmites, Purple Loosestrife and Saltcedar and /or contain the spread of noxious and new invasive aquatic plants.

The LPWMA is a group of County weed superintendent's, public, private agencies and individuals that are concerned with stopping the spread of phragmites, purple loosestrife, saltcedar and other noxious and invasive aquatic plants located in the Lower Platte River Drainage Area.

The LPWMA is located in the Platte River Drainage Corridor in 10 Counties of East Central Nebraska The corridor consists of lakes, streams, creeks, ponds and wetlands that drain into the Platte River that wanders through the following Counties: Butler, Cass, Colfax, Dodge Douglas, Lancaster, Platte, Sarpy, Saunders, Seward.

How does being part of a weed management cooperative group benefit your county?

The Lower Platte Weed Management Area efforts have been partially funded by a Pulling Together Initiative grant from the National Fish & Wildlife Foundation, we have received grant funding from the State of Nebraska Department of Agriculture. We have received grant funding from Ducks Unlimited. With grant funding we where able purchase chemicals, print brochures pay for airboat & motorboat transpiration and hire seasonal part-time help. We also use a helicopter to spray large areas that were hard to get into.

I feel that being a part of a weed management group has helped create more public awareness for each of the counties involved with the Lower Platte WMA. In 2008 the Papio Missouri NRD spent over twenty three thousand dollars in Sarpy County on helicopter spraying along the Platte River and the NRD also gave five thousand dollars for the purchase of an ATV. It has been my hope that some type of a maintenance river spraying fund could be obtained through the Papio NRD. And this season we are going to receive funding from the Papio NRD.

There is always some new construction going on somewhere that will invite new infestations to start.

Purple Loosestrife

Inspections for purple loosestrife will be made throughout the 2013 growing -season. Property owners With infestations of purple loosestrife will be contacted in one of the following manners in person by phone, letter or legal notice. Control methods will be discussed during these contacts property owners that have ornamental plantings will be instructed as to the proper disposal of the plant. Ten Day Notices will be used if all other attempts fail.

Musk Thistle

Inspections for musk thistle will be made in Sarpy County throughout the 2013 growing - season. Property owners that have infestations of musk thistle will be contacted in one of the following manners in person by phone, letter or legal notice, Control methods will be discussed during these contacts the Superintendent will work with the property owners to gain control of the infestations.

Canada thistle, Plumeless Thistle & Leafy Spurge

Inspections for Canada thistle, plumeless thistle & leafy spurge will be made throughout the 2013 growing season. Sarpy County has light infestations of these three noxious weeds they are found mainly along County Roadsides and State Highways. Control for these infestations will be to spray both spring and fall to control roadsides. As with all noxious weeds the Superintendent will assist the privet property owners with control recommendations and issue notices as needed.

Spotted and Diffuse Knapweeds & Saltcedar

No infestations of spotted or diffuse knapweeds have been found in Sarpy County each season I seem to find one saltcedar plant. I will keep the infestation at one acre as with all noxious weeds control efforts will continue throughout the 2013 season.

Phragmites

During the mid summer & fall of 2012 all of my river phragmites was again spayed by airboat. I also sprayed all of the upland phragmites sites that I found. Inspections for phragmites will be made throughout the 2013 season and the infestations will be sprayed as they are found.

Japanese Knotweed and or Bohemian Knotweed

Became a noxious weed in February of 2011 in the State of Nebraska I have around five Bohemian Knotweed sites in the La Platte area. The State of Nebraska Department of Roads is building a new interchange in that area which will lead to the new bridge across the Missouri River. Some of the Bohemian Knotweed sites are now gone due to construction the dirt has been moved, I will continue to spray and monitor the sites that remain throughout 2013 season.
