

Who Must Comply with the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations?

<p>I operate in interstate commerce a commercial motor vehicle or a combination of motor vehicles with a gross combination weight rating of 26,001 pounds or more, inclusive of a towed unit with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than 10,000 pounds;</p> <p>OR</p> <p>has a gross vehicle weight rating of 26,001 pounds or more;</p> <p>OR</p> <p>is designed to transport 16 or more passengers including the driver;</p> <p>OR</p> <p>is of any size and is used to transport hazardous materials which require the vehicle to be placarded.</p>	<p>All of the above regulations PLUS:</p> <p>Part 382, Controlled Substances/Alcohol Part 383, Commercial Driver's License Part 40, Drug & Alcohol Testing Programs</p> <p>Part 397, Transportation of Hazardous Materials (if applicable)</p> <p>Parts 171-180, Hazardous Materials Regulations (if applicable)</p>

Truck and bus companies, and many companies that operate trucks and buses as part of their business, are subject to some or all of the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations.

This brochure is intended as a guide and identifies principal regulatory areas and the types of truck and bus operations covered by each. It provides only a summary of these regulatory areas. For more detailed information, the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations, 49 CFR Parts 40, 382-396) and the Federal Hazardous Materials Regulations, 49 CFR Parts 171-180, should be consulted. Who Needs a U.S. DOT Number?

Every commercial motor vehicle (see definition below) used in interstate commerce.

What is a Commercial Motor Vehicle?

Any self-propelled or towed motor vehicle used on a highway in interstate commerce to transport passengers or property when the vehicle—

- (1) has a gross vehicle weight rating or gross combination weight rating, or gross vehicle weight or gross combination weight, of 10,001 pounds or more, whichever is greater; or
- (2) is designed or used to transport more than 8 passengers (including the driver) for compensation; or
- (3) is designed or used to transport more than 15 passengers, including the driver, and is not used to transport passengers for compensation; or
- (4) is used in transporting material found by the Secretary of Transportation to be hazardous and transported in a quantity requiring placarding.

How Do I apply for a U.S. DOT Number?

To obtain your U.S. DOT number instantly, file on-line at www.dot.gov.

You can also request an application (MCS-150 & MCS-150A) by calling the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) at 1-800-832-5660, or by calling the FMCSA office in your respective state.

Do I Need FMCSA Operating Authority (MC Number)?

If you are an interstate carrier who is for-hire (not hauling your own commodity), you also need FMCSA Operating Authority if you are not hauling an exempt commodity.

To obtain operating authority, you must submit an OP-1 form as an application for a MC Number. There is a non-refundable \$300 filing fee for each type of authority you request. To obtain a MC Number, go to <http://diy.dot.gov> or call 1-800-832-5660 to request an application be mailed or faxed to you.

In addition to the OP-1 form, you must also have your insurance company file the appropriate insurance forms for the type of authority you are requesting from FMCSA, and you must submit or have a Process Agent Service submit a BOC-3, Designation of Process Agent form.
