

Definitions and References

The Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulation (FMCSR) are found at 49 CFR Parts 382-398. The definition for "commercial motor vehicle" is in Part 390.

A "commercial motor vehicle" is:

Any self-propelled or towed motor vehicle used on a highway in commerce to transport passengers or property when the vehicle—

- ❖ Has a gross vehicle weight rating or gross combination weight rating or gross vehicle weight or gross combination weight in excess of 10,000 pounds; or
- ❖ Is designed or used to transport more than 8 passengers (including the driver) for compensation; or
- ❖ Is designed or used to transport more than 15 passengers (including the driver) and is not used to transport passenger for compensation; or
- ❖ Is used in transporting hazardous materials requiring placards

Who Needs A DOT Number

Every Commercial Motor Vehicle used in commerce with a

- gross vehicle weight rating in excess of 10,000 pounds or
- gross combination weight rating in excess of 10,000 pounds or
- gross vehicle weight in excess of 10,000 pounds or
- gross combination weight in excess of 10,000 pounds or
- to all trucks required to be placarded pursuant to State Statute 75-364

You may need a CDL if you answer yes to any of the following:

- Is it a combination vehicle with combined weight ratings greater than 26,000 lbs. (towed vehicle has GVWR greater than 10,000 lbs.)?
- Is it a single straight vehicle with a GVWR greater than 26,000 lbs?
- Is the vehicle designed to carry 16 or more passengers including the driver?
- Is the vehicle required to display a hazardous materials placard?

Who Must Comply with the Intrastate Motor Carrier Safety Regulations? (Interstate Motor Carriers must comply with all the FMCSR's)

In 1986, the Nebraska Legislature adopted the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations as part of state law (§75-363 to §75-368). These regulations apply to both interstate motor carriers and intrastate motor carriers operating vehicles meeting any of the criteria listed.

This brochure is intended as a guide for intrastate operations. It identifies principal regulatory areas and the types of truck and bus operations covered by each. It provides only a summary of these regulatory areas. For more detailed information, the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations (Title 49, Parts 382 – 398) and the Hazardous Materials Regulations (Title 49, Parts 171-180) should be consulted. These regulations may be obtained from your Nebraska Trucking Association, or from a number of commercial sources.

1. I operate a pickup pulling a trailer (over 10,000 lbs. combined weight*) within the State of Nebraska

2. I operate a truck (over 10,000 lbs. *) within the State of Nebraska (intrastate).

3. I operate a pickup pulling a trailer, a truck, or a truck/tractor-semi trailer requiring a class A, B, or C Commercial Drivers License (CDL) within the State of Nebraska (intrastate).

4. I haul hazardous material in a quantity requiring placarding within the State of Nebraska (intrastate).

5. I am a Nebraska Farmer with trucks displaying farm plates and registered for more than 16 tons operating strictly within the State of Nebraska (intrastate).

These Motor Carrier Safety Regulations apply to your operation(s) if you **do not need a CDL** license for the vehicle:
Part 385 Safety Fitness Procedures,
Part 387 Insurance (for hire motor carriers, and/or motor carriers hauling certain Hazardous Materials),
Part 390 Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulation General (including applying for a DOT number),
Part 393 Parts and Accessories Necessary for Safe Operation,
Part 396 Inspection, Repair and Maintenance.

These Motor Carrier Safety Regulations apply to your operation(s) if you **need a CDL** license for the vehicle:
Part 382 Alcohol and Drug Testing Requirements,
Part 385 Safety Fitness Procedures,
Part 387 Insurance (for hire motor carriers, and/or motor carriers hauling certain Hazardous Materials),
Part 390 Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulation General (including applying for a DOT number),
Part 391 Driver Qualifications (Physical qualifications shall not apply to drivers who hold or have held a NE CDL issued prior to 07/30/96),
Part 392 Driving of Motor Vehicles,
Part 393 Parts and Accessories Necessary for Safe Operation,
Part 395 Hours of Service for Drivers,
Part 396 Inspection, Repair and Maintenance,
Part 397 Transportation of Hazardous Materials

These Motor Carrier Safety Regulations apply to your operation(s):
Part 382 Alcohol and Drug Testing Requirements, for drivers of vehicles requiring CDL's (this applies to all farm truck-tractors; and any farm truck, requiring a CDL when operated beyond the 150 mile radius),
Part 385 Safety Fitness Procedures,
Part 390 Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulation General (excluding applying for a DOT number),
Part 392 Driving of Motor Vehicles,
Part 393 Parts and Accessories Necessary for Safe Operation,
Part 396 Inspection, Repair and Maintenance,
Part 397 Transportation of Hazardous Materials

NOTE: Fertilizer/Agricultural Chemical Application/Distribution Equipment with a capacity of 3,500 gallons or less, not required to be placarded pursuant to 75-364 and Farm Trucks registered for 16 Tons or less are not required to comply with the motor carrier safety regulation when used strictly in INTRA-STATE operations.
